### Mean field continuation

$$\min_{q \in Q_{MF}} KL(q \parallel p)$$

$\downarrow$

$\{ q : q(x) = \prod_i q_i(x_i) \}$

[ see lecture 22 in 2017, for "marginal polytope" ]



•  $KL(\cdot \parallel p)$  is a convex of  $q$

but  $Q_{MF}$  is a non-convex constraint set  $\rightarrow$  can get stuck in local minima


Icing model

non-convex constraint



$$M_{ij} = M_i \cdot M_j$$

but can monitor progress



pros & cons of variational methods

vs. sampling

(+) optimization based  
 $\Rightarrow$  often faster to run  
& easier to debug

(-) noisy  $\Rightarrow$  harder to debug  
mixing problem for chains

(-) biased estimate

$$\mathbb{E}_{q^{(t)}} [f(z)] \neq \mathbb{E}_p [f(z)]$$

(+) unbiased estimate

$$\mathbb{E} \left[ \mathbb{E}_{q^{(t)}} [f(z)] \right] = \mathbb{E}_p [f(z)]$$


with respect to  
random sample


structured mean field:


idea  $q(z) = \prod_{j=1}^K q_j(z_{C_j})$  where  $C_1, \dots, C_K$  is a partition of  $V$

and  $q_j$ 's are tractable distributions  
(for example tree UGM)





## Bayesian methods:



"frequentist": bag of tails  $\hat{\theta}$

"subjective Bayesian"

→ use prob. everywhere there is uncertainty


→ focus on  $p(\theta|data)$  or  $p(data|\theta) p(\theta)$

consequence: Bayesian is "optimist"  
they think you can get "good" models

⇒ obtain a method by doing inference in model

## Example: biased coin:

$$x_i | \theta \sim \text{Bernoulli}(\theta)$$



$$p(\theta) = \text{Beta}(\theta | \alpha_0, \beta_0)$$

$$p(x_i | \theta) = \theta^{x_i} (1-\theta)^{1-x_i}$$

$$\begin{aligned} \text{posterior} &= p(\theta | x_{1:n}) \propto \prod_i p(x_i | \theta) p(\theta) \\ &= \theta^{\sum x_i} (1-\theta)^{n - \sum x_i} \underbrace{\theta^{\alpha_0-1} (1-\theta)^{\beta_0-1}}_{\text{Beta}(\theta | \alpha_0, \beta_0)} \prod_{i=1}^n (x_i) \end{aligned}$$

$$\Rightarrow p(\theta | data) = \text{Beta}(\theta | \alpha_0 + n_1, \beta_0 + n - n_1)$$

↳ "conjugate prior" to the Bernoulli likelihood model

more generally,

consider a family  $F$  of dist.  $F = \{ p(\theta|x) : \theta \in \Theta \}$

say that  $F$  is a "conjugate family" to observation model  $p(x|\theta)$

If posterior  $p(\theta|x, \alpha) \in F$  for any  $\alpha \in X^{\text{obs}}$

$$\text{i.e. } \exists \text{ ran } \alpha^*(x, \epsilon) \text{ s.t. } p(\theta|x, \alpha) = p(\theta|\alpha^*)$$

Sidenote:

If use conjugate prior in a DGM

then Gibbs sampling can be easy


[e.g. this is case  
in LDA topic model]

Example back 1:

Dirichlet prior

is conjugate


for multinomial likelihood model

Model selection:

Say we want to choose  
between 2 DGM



(note here that  $M_1 \subseteq M_2$ )

canavier notation

as a frequentist:  $\hat{\theta}_{M_1}^{ML} = \underset{G_0, G_1, G_2}{\operatorname{argmax}} \log p(\text{data} | G_0, G_1, G_2, \text{"model}=M_1")$

$\hat{\theta}_{M_2}^{ML} = \underset{G_0, G_1, \hat{G}_2}{\operatorname{argmax}} \log p(\text{data} | G_0, G_1, \hat{G}_2, \text{"model}=M_2")$

P different space  
than  $G_2$

how to choose between models?

Can't compare  $\log p(\text{data} | \hat{\theta}_{M_1}^{ML}, M=M_1)$  vs.  $\log p(\text{data} | \hat{\theta}_{M_2}^{ML}, M=M_2)$

because LHS  $\leq$  RHS since  $M_1 \subseteq M_2$

(ie. you would always choose "bigger model")

→ as frequentist, use cross-validation

i.e.  $\log p(\text{test data} | \hat{G}_{M_i}^{\text{ML}}(\text{train}), D)$   
 $M = M_0$

Bayesian alternatives:

True Bayesian → sum over models (integrate out uncertainty about  $M$ )

introduce a prior over models  $p(M)$

$$p(x_{\text{new}} | D) = \sum_M p(x_{\text{new}} | D, M) p(M | D)$$

*data* sum over posterior over models

$$= \sum_M \left[ \int_{\theta \in \Theta} p(x_{\text{new}} | \theta, M) p(\theta | D, M) d\theta \right] p(M | D)$$

*Be  $\Theta$*  posterior one given data  $D$  & model  $M$

standard Bayesian predictive distribution for one model

*during model averaging*

(\*) in Model selection, forced to pick model

⇒ pick model that maximizes  $p(M | \text{data})$  or  $p(\text{data} | M) p(M)$

$$\boxed{p(\text{data} | M) = \text{"marginal likelihood"}}$$

$$\int_{\theta \in \Theta} p(\text{data} | \theta, M) p(\theta | M) d\theta$$

to compare two models, look at

$$\frac{p(M=M_1 | D)}{p(M=M_2 | D)} = \frac{p(D | M_1)}{p(D | M_2)} \frac{p(M_1)}{p(M_2)}$$

*Bayes factor* *prior ratio*

"uniform prior over models"; ⇒ then pick among  $k$  models  $M_1, \dots, M_k$


by max.  $p(\text{data} | M=M_i)$

"empirical Bayes" "type II ML"

when # of models is "small", then this approach is fine

(i.e. won't overfit)

Zoubin's cartoon: suppose  $M_1 \subseteq M_2 \subseteq M_3$



$p(D|M)$  is normalized over  $D$

vs,  
 $p(D|G_M(D), M)$  [can overfit badly]

but  $\prod_{M_i}$  can still overfit if have many nodes



say e.g.  $p(D|M) = S(D, M)$

how to compute marginal likelihood:


use approximations ← variational inference  
sampling

simple approximation → Bayesian information criteria

Causality:

structural causal model : graph model + intervention model

$$p(x) = \prod_{i=1}^n p(x_i | x_{\pi_i}, \epsilon_i)$$




identify causal direction ← via intervention

via parametric assumptions

Semantic of intervening on node  $J$

$$p(x_{\text{intervention}}) = \prod_{i \neq J} p(x_i | x_{\pi_i}, \epsilon_i) p(x_J | \text{intervention})$$
