Gaussian networks

$$X \sim N(\mu, \Sigma) \quad \mu \in \mathbb{R}^P \quad \Sigma \in \mathbb{R}^{P \times P} \quad \Sigma \geq 0$$

$$p(x; \mu, \Sigma) = \frac{1}{\sqrt{(2\pi)^P |\Sigma|}} \exp\left(-\frac{1}{2} \underbrace{(x-\mu)^T \Sigma^{-1} (x-\mu)}_{\text{tr}(\Sigma^{-1} (x-\mu)(x-\mu)^T)}\right)$$

put in exponential family

sufficient statistics

$$\tau(x) = \begin{pmatrix} x \\ -\frac{xx^T}{2} \end{pmatrix}$$

canonical parameter

$\begin{cases} \Sigma^{-1}, -\frac{xx^T}{2} \\ \Sigma \triangleq \Sigma^{-1} \\ \text{precision matrix} \end{cases}$

$$\begin{cases} \Sigma^{-1}, \mu \\ \Sigma \triangleq \Sigma^{-1} \\ n \triangleq 1 \\ \mu = \Sigma n = \Lambda^{-1} n \end{cases}$$

$$\text{canonical parameter } \tilde{\eta} \left(\begin{pmatrix} \mu \\ \Sigma \end{pmatrix} \right) = \begin{pmatrix} n \\ \Lambda \end{pmatrix} = \begin{pmatrix} \Sigma^{-1} \mu \\ \Sigma^{-1} \end{pmatrix}$$

$$p(x; n, \Lambda) = \exp(n^T x + \langle \Lambda, -\frac{xx^T}{2} \rangle - \underbrace{\left[\frac{1}{2} n^T \Lambda^{-1} n + \frac{P}{2} \log(2\pi) - \frac{1}{2} \log|\Lambda| \right]}_{A(n, \Lambda)})$$

$$\Omega = \left\{ (\mu, \Sigma) : \mu \in \mathbb{R}^P, \begin{cases} \Sigma \geq 0 \\ \Sigma = \Sigma^T, \Sigma \in \mathbb{R}^{P \times P} \end{cases} \right\}$$

$$A(n, \Lambda)$$

$$\text{useful exercise: } \nabla_{\mu} A(n, \Lambda) = \mathbb{E}[x] = \mu = \Lambda^{-1} n$$

$$\nabla_{\Sigma} A(n, \Lambda) = \mathbb{E}[-\frac{xx^T}{2}]$$

UGM viewpoint:

$$p(x; n, \Lambda) = \exp\left(-\frac{1}{2} \sum_{i,j} \Lambda_{ij} x_i x_j + \sum_i n_i x_i - A(n, \Lambda)\right)$$

$$P \in \mathcal{L}(G) \text{ where } E \triangleq \{ (i, j) \text{ s.t. } \Lambda_{ij} \neq 0 \}$$

zeros in precision matrix \Rightarrow cond. indep. properties \otimes

"Gaussian network"

$$p(x) = \prod_{\{i, j\} \in E} \Lambda_{ij} (x_i, x_j)$$

(from UGM perspective)

Quick Schur-complement digression =

$$\Sigma = \begin{pmatrix} \Sigma_{11} & \Sigma_{12} \\ \Sigma_{21} & \Sigma_{22} \end{pmatrix}$$

$$\begin{pmatrix} \Sigma_{11} & \Sigma_{12} \\ \Sigma_{21} & \Sigma_{22} \end{pmatrix}^{-1} = \begin{pmatrix} \Sigma_{11}^{-1} + \Sigma_{11}^{-1} \Sigma_{12} M^{-1} \Sigma_{21} \Sigma_{11}^{-1} & -\Sigma_{11}^{-1} \Sigma_{12} M^{-1} \\ -M^{-1} \Sigma_{21} \Sigma_{11}^{-1} & M^{-1} \end{pmatrix}$$

$$M \triangleq \Sigma / \Sigma_{11} \triangleq \Sigma_{22} - \Sigma_{21} \Sigma_{11}^{-1} \Sigma_{12} \quad \text{"Schur complement of } \Sigma \text{ w.r.t. } \Sigma_{11}$$

$$\Sigma / \Sigma_{22} = \Sigma_{11} - \Sigma_{12} \Sigma_{22}^{-1} \Sigma_{21}$$

* use this to derive the "Woodbury-Sherman-Morrison inversion formula"

property: $|\Sigma| = |\Sigma_{11}| |\Sigma / \Sigma_{11}| = |\Sigma_{22}| |\Sigma / \Sigma_{22}|$

$$p(x_1, x_2) = \frac{1}{\sqrt{(2\pi)^2 |\Sigma_{11}|}} \exp(-(\bar{x}_1 - \mu_1)^T \Sigma_{11}^{-1} (\bar{x}_1 - \mu_1)) \cdot \left\{ p(x_1) \right.$$

$$\left. \frac{1}{\sqrt{(2\pi)^2 |\Sigma / \Sigma_{11}|}} \exp(-(\bar{x}_2 - \mu_2 - b(x_1))^T (\Sigma / \Sigma_{11})^{-1} (\bar{x}_2 - \mu_2 - b(x_1))) \right\} p(x_2 | x_1)$$

where $b(x_1) \triangleq \Sigma_{21} \Sigma_{11}^{-1} (\bar{x}_1 - \mu_1)$

mean parameterization
of marginals &
conditionals

$$\begin{aligned} \mu_1^m &= \mu_1 & \left\{ \text{super simple?} \right. \\ \Sigma_1^m &= \Sigma_{11} & \left. \right\} \text{param. of} \\ && \text{marginal on } x_1 \end{aligned}$$

$$\begin{aligned} \mu_{2|x_1} &= \mu_2 + b(x_1) & \left\{ \text{for conditional} \right. \\ \Sigma_{2|x_1}^m &= \Sigma / \Sigma_{11} = \Sigma_{22} - \Sigma_{21} \Sigma_{11}^{-1} \Sigma_{12} & \left. \right\} x_2 | x_1 \end{aligned}$$

in canonical
param.

$$\Lambda_{2|x_1}^{\text{cond.}} = \Lambda_{22} \quad (\text{simple?})$$

$$\Lambda_{2|x_1}^{\text{cond.}} = \Lambda_2 - \Lambda_{21} x_1$$

$$\Lambda_1^m = \Lambda_1 - \Lambda_{12} \Lambda_{22}^{-1} \Lambda_{21}$$

$$\Lambda_1^m = \Lambda_{11} - \Lambda_{12} \Lambda_{22}^{-1} \Lambda_{21} = \Lambda / \Lambda_{22}$$

(more complicated)

for example: block $\underbrace{\{\cdot\}_{i,j}}_{I} \mid \text{rest}$

$$\text{cov}(X_i | X_{\text{rest}}) = \Sigma_{i| \text{rest}} = \Lambda_{ii}^{-1}$$

$$= \begin{pmatrix} \Lambda_{ii} & \Lambda_{ij} \\ \Lambda_{ji} & \Lambda_{jj} \end{pmatrix}^{-1}$$

if $\Lambda_{ij} = 0$

$$\text{get } \Sigma_{ii| \text{rest}} = \begin{pmatrix} \Lambda_{ii}^{-1} & 0 \\ 0 & \Lambda_{jj}^{-1} \end{pmatrix}$$

$$\Rightarrow \boxed{X_i \perp\!\!\!\perp X_j | X_{\text{rest}}}$$

(also true by Markov property of UGM)

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Factor analysis:

latent variable model


$$\begin{array}{c} \odot z \in \mathbb{R}^k \\ \Downarrow \\ \bullet x \in \mathbb{R}^d \end{array}$$

learn "latent representation"

or
dimensionality reduction $k \ll d$

PCA for dimensionality reduction

Synthetic view: find k orthonormal vectors in \mathbb{R}^d w_1, \dots, w_k
s.t. projection of x on $\text{span}\{w_1, \dots, w_k\}$
is a good approx. of x



$$W = \begin{bmatrix} w_1 & \dots & w_k \end{bmatrix} \quad W^T W = I_k \quad (\text{by orthonormality})$$

$$WW^T \neq I_d$$

$$P_W \triangleq WW^T \quad P_W^2 = WW^T W W^T = P_W$$

\hookrightarrow orthogonal projection matrix on $\text{span}\{w_1, \dots, w_k\} = \text{col}(W)$

$$P_W x = WW^T x$$

$$= (w_1 \dots w_k) \begin{pmatrix} \langle w_1, x \rangle \\ \vdots \\ \langle w_k, x \rangle \end{pmatrix}$$

$$= \sum_k w_k \underbrace{\langle w_k, x \rangle}_{(z)_k} = Wz$$


$$\boxed{\text{PCA} \quad \min_{\substack{W \in \mathbb{R}^{d \times k} \\ W^T W = I_k}} \sum_i \|x_i - W W^T x_i\|_2^2}$$

(col(w) \triangleq "principal" subspace)

$$X = \begin{pmatrix} -x_1^T \\ \vdots \\ -x_n^T \end{pmatrix}$$

$$\|X^T - WW^T X^T\|^2$$

$$z = W^T x \quad \hookrightarrow \text{lower dimensional representation}$$



W is not unique, only $\text{col}(W)$
e.g. $\sim \dots \sim \dots \sim \text{in } \dots T +$


$$\begin{aligned}
 & \text{empirical covariance of } x \text{ when } \sum x_i = 0 \text{ (mean=0)} \\
 & \frac{1}{n} X^T X = \frac{1}{n} \sum x_i x_i^T \\
 & = \| (I_d - P_w) X^T \|^2_F \\
 & = \text{tr} (X (I_d - P_w)^T (I_d - P_w) X^T) \\
 & = \text{tr} (X (I_d - P_w) X^T) = \text{tr} (X^T X (I_d - P_w)) \\
 & \min \text{ rec. error} \Leftrightarrow \text{maximize } \text{tr}(X^T X W W^T) = \sum \log_j^T X^T X w_k
 \end{aligned}$$

"analysis view of PCA" max sum of empirical variances of new representation

(computation of PCA \rightarrow top k eigenvectors of $X^T X$)

Factor analysis \rightarrow simplest generative model

$$\begin{aligned}
 & z \sim N(0, I_d) \\
 & x = Wz + \mu + \epsilon \quad \text{noise} \\
 & \epsilon \perp\!\!\!\perp z, z \sim N(0, D) \quad d \times d \text{ diagonal matrix}
 \end{aligned}$$



$$x | z \sim N(Wz + \mu, D)$$

$$p(x) \text{ is Gaussian; } \mathbb{E}[x] = \mathbb{E}[\underbrace{\mathbb{E}[x|z]}_{Wz + \mu}] = 0 + \mu = \mu$$

$$\begin{aligned}
 \text{cov}(x, x) &= \text{cov}(Wz + \mu + \epsilon, Wz + \mu + \epsilon) \\
 &= \text{cov}(Wz, Wz) + \text{cov}(\epsilon, \epsilon) \\
 &= W \text{cov}(z, z) W^T + D \\
 &= WW^T + D
 \end{aligned}$$

equivalent model on

$$x \sim N(\mu, WW^T + D)$$

low rank covariance piece diagonal D \rightarrow d degrees of freedom

estimate $W \in D + \mu$ by MLE

\rightsquigarrow do EM (latent variable model)

$$\text{get } p(z|x) \rightarrow \text{Gaussian with mean } \mathbb{E}[z|x] = W^T(WW^T + D)^{-1}(x - \mu_D)$$


probabilistic PCA: special case of factor analysis where suppose $D = \sigma^2 I$

$$\lim_{\sigma \rightarrow 0} W^T(WW^T + \sigma^2 I)^{-1} = W^T \leftarrow \text{pseudoinverse} \\ = W^T \quad \text{if } W^T W = I_K$$

Show PCA is limit of PPPCA as $\sigma \rightarrow 0$

(side: LDA model for text is basically $\begin{matrix} z \sim \text{Dir}(\alpha) \\ x \sim \text{Mult}(Wz, \alpha) \end{matrix}$)
 "discrete version of PPPCA"

Kalman filter



move to state space model: unroll in time
 (HMM style)

Kalman filter: $z_t | z_{t-1} \sim N(Az_{t-1}, B)$

→ doing "sum-product" alg. in HMM $p(z_t | x_{1:t})$
 get "Kalman filter alg."

Variational auto-encoder:

generalization of factor analysis



$$z \sim N(0, I_K)$$

$$x|z \sim N(\mu_w(z), \sigma_w^2(z))$$

"decoder"
where $\mu_w(z)$ & output of NN

MLE → use EM

$\uparrow p(z|x)$ is intractable \Rightarrow use variational approach

approximate $p(z|x)$ with $q_\varphi(z|x)$

$$z|x \sim N(\mu_\varphi(x), \sigma_\varphi^2(x))$$

$$\text{in EM: } \log p(x) \geq \mathbb{E}_q[\log p(x|z)] + H(q)$$

$$= \mathbb{E}_{q_\varphi} \left[\log \left(\frac{1}{n} \prod_{i=1}^n p(x_i|z_i) - k_1 / n \cdot (z_i \sim \mathcal{N}(\mu_\varphi(x_i), \sigma_\varphi^2(x_i))) \right) \right]$$

$$\begin{aligned}
 \text{in EM: } \log p(x) &\geq \mathbb{E}_{q_\phi(z|x)} [\log p_\theta(x|z)] + H(q_\phi) \\
 &= \mathbb{E}_{q_\phi(z|x)} [\log p_\theta(x|z)] - \text{KL}(q_\phi(z|x) \parallel p(z))
 \end{aligned}$$

allows "reparameterization trick"

$$z|x \rightarrow \mu_\phi(x) + \sigma_\phi(x) \cdot \xi \sim N(0,1)$$

- VAE innovations:
 - share parameters phi among data points for their variational approximation $q_\phi(z|x)$
 - re-parameterization trick to only have parameters appear in simple deterministic transformation, stochasticity is all left in $N(0,1)$ noise variables (no parameters) => allow simple backpropagation of gradient through expectations
