more properties of DGM

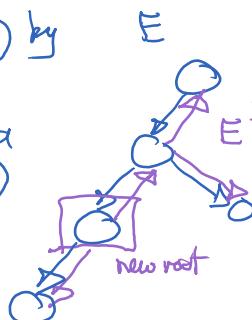
inclusion: $E \subseteq E' \Rightarrow f(G) \subseteq f(G')$

reversal: if G is a directed tree (or a forest)
 $\cup_{i=1}^n G_i$ i.e. there is no V-structure

let E' be another directed tree
 (with same undirected edges) by
 choose a different root

(reverse some edges, while keeping a
 directed tree)

$$\Rightarrow f(G) = f(G')$$



rephrasing:

all directed trees from an
 undirected tree give
same DGM

why direction of edges
are not causal in DGM



$$p(x|y) = p(x|y) \quad p(y) = p(y|x)p(x)$$

Marginalization

- marginalizing a leaf node n gives us a smaller DGM

Let $S = \{q\}$ is a dist. on $x_{1:n-1}$ s.t. $q|x_{1:n-1}) = \prod_{i=1}^{n-1} p(x_i)$

then $S = f(G')$ where G' is
 G with leaf n plucked (removed)

- not true for all marginalizations

e.g.

i.e. marginalization is not a "closed" operation on DGMs



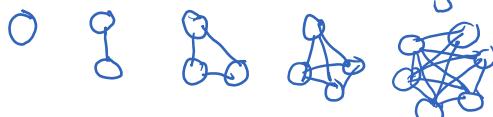
undirected GM (UGM) (a.k.a. Markov random field or Markov network)

Let $G = (V, E)$ be an undirected graph

Let \mathcal{C} be the set of cliques of G

clique = fully connected set of nodes

(if $i, j \in C \Leftrightarrow \forall i, j \in C, \exists i, j \in E$)



DGM associated with G

$$\mathcal{Z}(G) \triangleq \left\{ p \text{ is a dist over } \mathbb{X}_V : p(x_V) = \frac{1}{Z} \prod_{C \in \mathcal{C}} \psi_C(x_C) \right\}$$

for some "potentials" $\psi_C : \mathbb{X}_{x_C} \rightarrow \mathbb{R}_+$

$$\text{and } Z \triangleq \sum_{\text{normalization constant}} \prod_{C \in \mathcal{C}} \left(\prod_{x_C} \psi_C(x_C) \right)$$

"partition function"

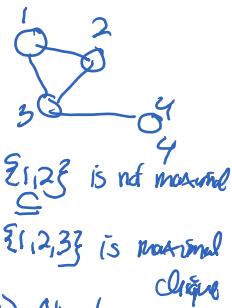
notes:

- unlike a DGM $\psi_C(x_C) = p(x_C | x_{\bar{C}})$ (where could think of C to be $\{i, \bar{i}\}$)
- $\psi_C(x_C)$ is not directly related to $p(x_C)$
- can rescale any potential without changing joint p (i.e. $\psi_C^{\text{new}}(x_C) \triangleq \psi_C^{\text{old}}(x_C) \cdot A$ for some $A > 0$)
- (unlike in DGM, where f_i 's were uniquely defined from p)
- It is sufficient to consider \mathcal{C}_{max} , the set of maximal cliques

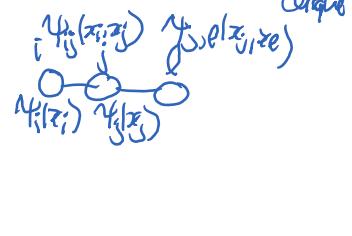
$$\text{e.g. } C' \subseteq C$$

$$\text{redefining } \psi_C^{\text{new}}(x_C) \triangleq \psi_C^{\text{old}}(x_C) \cdot \psi_{C'}^{\text{old}}(x_C)$$

If C' belongs to more than one C , just choose one



[we'll see later sometimes convenient to consider "over parameterization" of trees using both $\psi_i(x_i)$ and $\psi_{ij}(x_i, x_j)$]



Properties of DGM:

- as before $E \subseteq E' \Rightarrow \mathcal{Z}(G) \subseteq \mathcal{Z}(G')$

$E = \emptyset \Rightarrow \mathcal{Z}(G) = \text{set of fully factorized dist.}$

$E = \text{all pairs}$
(i.e. V is just one big clique in G)

$$\langle \Theta_C, T_C(x_C) \rangle \quad \text{where} \quad T_C(x_C) = \begin{pmatrix} 0 \\ 1 \\ 0 \\ 0 \end{pmatrix} e^{x_C}$$

$\underbrace{\log \psi_C(x_C)}_{\text{dim} = |\mathbb{X}_{x_C}|} - \log Z$

- if $\psi_C(x_C) > 0 \ \forall x_C, \forall C$

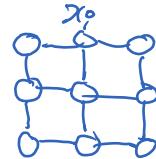
then can write $p(x_V) = \exp \left(\sum_{C \in \mathcal{C}} \log \psi_C(x_C) - \log Z \right)$

$\underbrace{\dots \dots}_{\text{graph}} \quad \underbrace{\text{w.r.t. } \mathcal{E}_G \text{ by def.}}_{\text{physic link: negative energy}}$

$\dim = |\mathcal{E}_G|$
 $G_C(x) = \log N_G(x)$

e.g. Ising model in physics

$$x_i \in \{0, 1\}$$



$$\text{node potential } E_i = \log N_G(x_i=1)$$

$$\text{edge potential } E_{ij} = \log N_G(x_i=1, x_j=1)$$

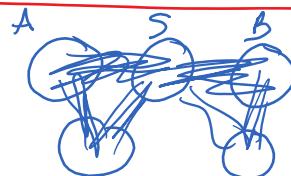

Conditional independence for $G \cup M$:

def: we say that p satisfies global Markov property (with respect to a undirected graph G)

iff $\forall A, B, S \subseteq V$ s.t. S separates A from B in G
then $X_A \perp\!\!\!\perp X_B \mid X_S$



prop:

$p \in \mathcal{P}(G) \Rightarrow p$ satisfies the global Markov property for G

Proof: WLOG, we assume $A \cup B \cup S = V \nsubseteq A$ separated from B by S

[why? if not, $\tilde{A} \triangleq A \cup \{a \in V : a \text{ and } A \text{ are not separated by } S\}$]

$$\tilde{B} \triangleq V \setminus (S \cup \tilde{A}) \Rightarrow \tilde{A} \cup \tilde{B} \cup S = V$$

then if we have $X_{\tilde{A}} \perp\!\!\!\perp X_{\tilde{B}} \mid X_S$
by decomposition
 $\Rightarrow X_A \perp\!\!\!\perp X_B \mid X_S$

$A \subseteq \tilde{A}$ $B \subseteq \tilde{B}$
[exercise: show that if $b \in \tilde{B}$
 $\Rightarrow b$ is separated from \tilde{A} by S]

$$V = A \cup S \cup B$$

let $C \in \mathcal{E}$



cannot have both $C \cap A \neq \emptyset$ and $C \cap B \neq \emptyset$

(because of separation)

$$\text{thus } p(x) = \prod_{\substack{C \in \mathcal{E} \\ C \subseteq A \cup S}} \pi_{N_C(x)} \prod_{\substack{C \in \mathcal{E} \\ C \not\subseteq A \cup S}} \pi_{N_C(x)} = f(x_{A \cup S}) g(x_{B \cup S})$$

$$\Rightarrow C \subseteq B \cup S$$

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$$\Rightarrow C \subseteq B_{\text{DS}}$$

$$p(x_A | x_S) \text{ or } p(\underbrace{x_A, x_S}_{x_{\text{AUS}}}) = \sum_{x_B} p(x_V) = \sum_{x_0} f(x_{\text{AUS}}) g(x_{\text{bus}})$$

$$= f(x_{\text{AUS}}) \underbrace{\sum_{x_B} g(x_{\text{bus}})}_{\substack{\text{constant w.r.t. } x_A \\ (\text{constant w.r.t. } x_A)}}$$

similarly, $p(x_B | x_S) = \underbrace{g(x_{\text{bus}})}_{\sum_{x_B} g(x_B; x_S)}$

$$p(x_A | x_S) p(x_B | x_S) = \frac{f(x_{\text{AUS}}) g(x_{\text{bus}})}{\sum_{x_A} f(x_A; x_S) \sum_{x_B} g(x_B; x_S)} \left. \begin{array}{l} \{ p(x_V) = p(x_A, x_B | x_S) \\ \{ p(x_S) \end{array} \right\} \text{ i.e. } X_A \amalg X_B | X_S //$$

thm: (Hammersley-Clifford) if $\underbrace{p(x_V)}_{> 0}$ $\forall x_V$
 then $p \in \mathcal{S}(G) \Leftrightarrow p$ satisfies the global Markov property for G

Proof: see ch. 16 of Mike's book; use "Möbius inversion formula"
 (as exclusion-inclusion principle in prob.)
