dual problem for max. entropy

Max. ENT. in primal form

$$\min_{q \in \mathbb{R}^K} M$$

$$M = \left\{ \begin{array}{l} \sum_x q(x) \log \frac{q(x)}{u(x)} \\ q(x) > 0 \quad \forall x \\ \sum_x q(x) = 1 \\ \sum_x q(x) T_j(x) = \alpha_j \quad \forall j \end{array} \right.$$

absorb this constraint in domain of def. of $KL(q||u)$

$KL(q||u) = \begin{cases} +\infty & \text{if } q(x) < 0 \text{ for some } x \\ KL(q||u) & \text{o.w.} \end{cases}$

$$J(q, v, c) = \sum_x q(x) \log \frac{q(x)}{u(x)} + \sum_j v_j (\alpha_j - \sum_x q(x) T_j(x)) + c \left(1 - \sum_x q(x)\right)$$

\uparrow K-dim scalar
 \uparrow d-dim scalar

$$\frac{\partial}{\partial q(x)} = \log \frac{q(x)}{u(x)} + 1 - \sum_j v_j T_j(x) - c \stackrel{\text{want}}{=} 0 \Rightarrow NT(x) = \sum_j v_j T_j(x)$$

$$\Rightarrow q^{*}_{v,c}(x) = u(x) \exp(v^T T(x) + c - 1)$$

\uparrow Generalized MaxENT
 \uparrow $KL(q||u_0)$
 \uparrow $h_u(x)$

Exponential Family?

dual fact.:
 plug $q^{*}_{v,c}$ in $J(\dots)$

$$g(v, c) = J(q^{*}_{v,c}, v, c)$$

$$= \mathbb{E}_{q^{*}} [v^T f(x) + c - 1] + v^T \alpha - \mathbb{E}_{q^{*}} [v^T f(x)]$$

$$= v^T \alpha + c - \mathbb{E}_{q^{*}} [1]$$

$$\mathbb{E}_{q^{*}} [1] = \sum_x u(x) \exp(v^T T(x)) \exp(c - 1)$$

max $g(v, c)$
 with respect to c

$$\nabla_c = 0 \Rightarrow 1 - Z(v) \exp(c - 1) \stackrel{\text{want}}{=} 0 \Rightarrow \exp(c - 1) = \frac{1}{Z(v)}$$

$$\text{plug back } C^*: \max_c g(v, c) = v^T \alpha + c^* - \frac{Z(v)}{Z(v)}$$

$$c^* - 1 \stackrel{\text{want}}{=} -\log Z(v)$$

$$\text{dual problem } \max_v \tilde{g}(v) \quad \boxed{\tilde{g}(v) \triangleq v^T \alpha - \log Z(v)}$$

link with MLE :

$$\text{if } \alpha = \frac{1}{n} \sum_i T(x^{(i)}) = \mathbb{E}_{p_n}[T(X)]$$

$$\text{then } \tilde{g}(\nu) = \frac{1}{n} \sum_{i=1}^n \left[\nu^\top T(x^{(i)}) - \log Z(\nu) \right]$$

$$\log p(x^{(i)} | \nu) + \text{const.}$$

$$\text{where } p(x | \nu) \triangleq u(x) \exp(\nu^\top T(x) - \log Z(\nu))$$

i.e. dual problem is $\max_{\nu} \tilde{g}(\nu) = \max_{\nu} \frac{1}{n} \sum_i \log p(x_i | \nu)$ i.e. MLE

to summarize: ML in exp. family with $T(x)$ as suff. statistics

is equivalent to Max ENT with moment constraints on $T(X)$

$$\text{where } \alpha = \mathbb{E}_{p_n}[T(X)]$$

exp. family dist.

They are Lagrangian dual of each other?

MLE in exp. family \Leftrightarrow moment matching in exp. family



note [direct derivation]:

$$\begin{aligned} \nabla_{\nu} \log Z(\nu) &= \frac{1}{Z(\nu)} \nabla_{\nu} \left(\sum_x u(x) \exp(\nu^\top T(x)) \right) \\ &= \sum_x T(x) \underbrace{\frac{u(x) \exp(\nu^\top T(x))}{Z(\nu)}}_{p(x|\nu)} \end{aligned}$$

$$\nabla_{\nu} \log Z(\nu) = \mathbb{E}_{p(x|\nu)} [T(X)] \triangleq \mu(\nu) \quad \text{"model moment"}$$

$$\nabla_{\nu} \tilde{g}(\nu) = \underbrace{\alpha}_{\mathbb{E}_{p_n}[T(X)]} - \mu(\nu)$$

$$\underbrace{\mathbb{E}_{p_n}[T(X)]}_{\mu_n}$$

μ_n "empirical moment"

$$\text{want } \nabla_{\nu} \tilde{g}(\nu) = 0 \Rightarrow \boxed{\mu(\nu^*) = \mu_n} \quad \text{i.e. moment matching?}$$

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Exponential family

a (flat/canonical) exponential family on X

is a parametric family of dist. on X defined by two quantities:

I) $h(x) d\mu(x) \rightarrow$ reference measure

reference density
base measure

counting measure (discrete R.V.) $\rightarrow \sum_x$ pmf
Lebesgue measure (cts. f.d.v.) $\rightarrow \int_x$ pdf

II) $T: X \rightarrow \mathbb{R}^P$ called "sufficient statistics" vector
aka feature vector

members of the family will have pmf/pdf

$$p(x; n) d\mu(x) = \exp(n^T T(x) - A(n)) h(x) d\mu(x)$$

"canonical parameters"

log normalization

or cumulant generating
log partition fct. functions

If \mathcal{Q}_X is discrete, then $p(x; n)$ is a pmf

" is cts. " " " " pdf

(for binary example $d\mu(x)$ is counting)

$$\delta_{x_0} + \delta_{x_1}$$

* want $1 = \int_X p(x; n) d\mu(x) = \int_X \exp(n^T T(x)) e^{-A(n)} h(x) d\mu(x)$

discrete $\left[\sum_x p(x; n) \right]$
 $\stackrel{\text{by}}{\neq}$

$$\Rightarrow A(n) \triangleq \log \left(\int_X \exp(n^T T(x)) h(x) d\mu(x) \right) \quad z(n)$$

domain $\mathcal{Q} \triangleq \{n \in \mathbb{R}^P \mid A(n) < \infty\}$

Set of valid canonical parameters

note: $A(n)$ is convex in n $\Rightarrow \mathcal{Q}$ is convex

④ more generally, consider a reparameterization of a subset of the flat family

by defining $\eta: \Theta \rightarrow \mathcal{Q}$

* new set of parameters

$$\text{consider } p(x; \theta) \triangleq p(x; \eta(\theta)) \text{ for } \theta \in \Theta$$

(get "curved exponential family" if $m(\Theta)$ is a curved manifold)

↳ e.g. could consider Gaussians where $N(\mu, \mu^2)$

* Note: any single dist. p(x) can be put in an exp. family by using $h(x) = p(x)$

* two examples of family not an exp. family:

- mixture of Gaussians (latent variable model)
- unif (0, theta)

Example: (Multinomial)

$$X \sim \text{Mult}(\pi) \quad X = \xi_{0,1}^k$$

$$\Omega_X = \Delta_k \cap X \quad (\text{one hot encodings})$$

parameters $\pi \in \Delta_k$; suppose $\pi_j > 0 \ \forall j$

$$\begin{aligned} p(x; \pi) &= \prod_{j=1}^k \pi_j^{x_j} = \exp\left(\sum_j x_j \log \pi_j\right) \\ &\stackrel{\text{think as}}{=} \exp\left(\sum_j x_j \log \pi_j - \log \sum_j \pi_j\right) \end{aligned}$$

We have $M_j(\pi) = \log \pi_j \quad \Omega_X \subseteq \mathbb{R}^k$

$T(x) = x \quad \rightarrow \quad \Omega_X \subseteq \mathbb{R}^k$
 $d\pi(x) = \text{counting measure on } X$

$$h(x) = \mathbf{1}\{x \in \Omega_X\} = \mathbf{1}\{x \in \Delta_k \cap X\}$$

$$\textcircled{H} = \text{int}(\Delta_k) \quad A(m(\pi)) = 0 \quad \forall \pi \in \textcircled{H}$$

$$\begin{array}{l} \textcircled{H} \rightarrow \text{dimension } k-1 \\ m(\Theta) \rightarrow " " \\ \Omega_X \rightarrow " " \quad k \end{array}$$

We do not have a "minimal exponential family"

Note: ^{here} for any x s.t. $h(x) \neq 0$

$$\text{here } \sum_{j=1}^k T_j(x) = \sum_j x_j = 1$$

affine linear dep. between components of T
 \Rightarrow multiple π 's give rise to same dist.
 $\downarrow \quad \downarrow \quad \text{overparameterization}$

↪ not a "minimal" exp. family

* for multinomial, minimal exp. family

$$\tau(x) = \begin{pmatrix} x_1 \\ \vdots \\ x_{k-1} \end{pmatrix}$$

$$z(n) = \sum_{x \in \Omega_X} \exp(n^\top \tau(x)) = \sum_{j=1}^{k-1} \exp(n_j) + 1$$

$$p(x; n) = \exp \left(\sum_{j=1}^{k-1} n_j x_j - \underbrace{\log \left(\sum_{j=1}^{k-1} e^{n_j} + 1 \right)}_{A(n)} \right)$$

verified

$$\text{recall: } \nabla_n A(n) = \mathbb{E}_{p(x|n)} [\tau(x)] \quad (\text{valid for } n \in \text{int}(\Omega))$$

$$\text{for multinomial, } \frac{\partial A}{\partial n_j} = \frac{1}{z(n)} e^{n_j} = p("x=j" | n)$$

$= \mathbb{E}_{p(x|n)} [\tau_j(x)]$ as required //
