
Comparing procedures?

$\hat{S}_1$  vs.  $\hat{S}_2$

$$\text{(frequentist) risk } R(P, S) \triangleq \mathbb{E}_{D \sim P} [L(P, S(D))]$$

(think cross-validation)

"risk profils"



\* transform to scalar

• "minimax" analysis:  $\min_{P \in \mathcal{P}} R(P, S)$  "worst case"

• weighted average

$$\int_{\mathcal{P}} R(P, S) \pi(G) dG$$

(kind of  
a Bayesian  
feel)

PAC theory vs. frequentist risk:

in ML, usually they look at tail bounds for dist. of  $L(P, S(D))$  where  $D$  is random


PAC theory

↳ "probably approx. correct"

$$P\{L(P, S(D)) \geq \text{stuff}\} < \delta$$

example of  
generalization  
error bound

$$\text{test error}(\hat{f}) \leq \text{train error}(\hat{f}) + \sqrt{\frac{\text{complexity}(\hat{f})}{n} + \log(\frac{1}{\delta})}$$



(with prob  $\geq 1 - \delta$   
on  $D$ )

Bayesian decision theory

→ condition on data  $D$

Bayesian posterior risk

$$R_B(a|D) = \int_{\mathcal{G}} L(G, a) p(G|D) dG$$

posterior over "possible worlds"  
 $\propto N(\theta) \sim \mathcal{N}(1/\lambda)$

(4) posterior over "possible worlds"  
 $\propto p(\theta) p(D|\theta)$

Bayesian optimal action:  $S_{\text{Bayes}}(D) \triangleq \underset{a \in A}{\operatorname{argmax}} R_B(a|D)$


example: if  $A = \Theta$  ("estimation")

$$L(\theta, a) = (\theta - a)^2$$

then (elsewhere)  $S_{\text{Bayes}}(D) = \mathbb{E}[\theta|D]$  (posterior mean)

but if use  $L(\theta, a) = |\theta - a|$  (ID)

then  $S_{\text{Bayes}}(D) = \underline{\text{posterior median}}$



when using prior  $\pi$  as the weighting fct.  
 i.e.  $\pi(G) = p(G)$

Examples of estimators:  $S: D \rightarrow \Theta$

- 1) MLE
- 2) MAP
- 3) method of moments (MoM)

idea: find an injective mapping from  $\Theta$  to "moments" of R.V.

$$\mathbb{E}X, \mathbb{E}X^2, \dots$$

and then invert it from empirical moments to get  $\hat{\theta}$

$$\hat{\mathbb{E}}[X] \triangleq \frac{1}{n} \sum_{i=1}^n x_i$$

$$\hat{\mathbb{E}}[X^2] \triangleq \frac{1}{n} \sum_{i=1}^n x_i^2 \dots$$

example: for Gaussian  $X \sim N(\mu, \sigma^2)$


$$\begin{aligned}\mathbb{E}X &= \mu \\ \mathbb{E}X^2 &= \sigma^2 + \mu^2\end{aligned}$$

$$f(\mu, \sigma^2) \triangleq \begin{pmatrix} \mu \\ \sigma^2 \end{pmatrix}$$

$$\begin{pmatrix} \hat{\mu} \\ \hat{\sigma}^2 \end{pmatrix} \triangleq f^{-1}\left(\begin{pmatrix} \hat{E}[x] \\ \hat{E}[x^2] \end{pmatrix}\right) = \begin{pmatrix} \hat{E}[x] \\ \hat{E}[x^2] - (\hat{E}[x])^2 \end{pmatrix}$$

(here, this estimator is same as MLE)  
 [general property in exponential family]

MoM is quite used for latent variable models  
 ↳ ("spectral methods" e.g.)

4) Prediction example  $\mathcal{P}_t = \{f: X \rightarrow \mathbb{R}\}$  X ∈ input space  
y ∈ output "

example of  $S: D \rightarrow \mathcal{P}_t$

is using empirical "risk" minimization (ERM)

↳ Vapnik risk i.e. generalization error / test error

$$\text{i.e. } L(P_t, f) = \mathbb{E}_{(x, y) \sim P} [\ell(y, f(x))]$$

replace this with  $\hat{\mathbb{E}}[\ell(y, f(x))] = \frac{1}{n} \sum_{i=1}^n \ell(y_i, f(x_i))$

$$\hat{S}_{\text{ERM}} = \underset{f \in \mathcal{F}}{\operatorname{argmin}} \hat{\mathbb{E}}[\ell(y, f(x))]$$

↳ hypothesis class

James-Stein estimator:

estimator to estimate the mean of  $N(\vec{\mu}, \sigma^2 I) \leftarrow d \text{ independent Gaussian variables } x_i \sim N(\mu_i, \sigma^2)$

$S_{JS}$  is biased, but much lower variance than MLE

recall bias-variance decomposition  $R(\theta, \hat{\theta}) = \mathbb{E} \|(\theta - \hat{\theta})\|_2^2$

$$= \underbrace{\|\mathbb{E}\hat{\theta} - \theta\|_2^2}_{\text{bias}^2} + \underbrace{\mathbb{E}[(\hat{\theta} - \mathbb{E}\hat{\theta})^2]}_{\text{variance}}$$

$S_{JS}$  actually strictly dominates SMLE  
 for  $d \geq 3$   
 ↳ dimension of  $\vec{\mu}$

$$\text{i.e. } R(G, \delta_{JS}) \leq R(G, \delta_{MLE}) \forall G$$

$\vdash$  and  $\exists G$  s.t.  $R(G, \delta_{JS}) < R(G, \delta_{MLE})$

$\rightarrow$  MLE is inadmissible in this case [note  $n=1$  here]  $\Leftrightarrow d \geq 3$

(can interpret the  $\delta_{JS}$  as an "empirical" Bayesian method)

(asymptotic)  
properties of MLE:

under suitable regularity conditions on  $\mathbb{A} \ni \theta \mapsto p(x_i; \theta)$

$$\hat{\theta}_n = \underset{\theta \in \mathbb{A}}{\operatorname{argmax}} \frac{1}{n} \sum_{i=1}^n \log p(x_i; \theta)$$

a)  $\hat{\theta}_n \xrightarrow{P} \theta$  "consistent"

b) CLT

(central limit theorem)

$$\sqrt{n}(\hat{\theta}_n - \theta) \xrightarrow{\text{dist.}} N(0, I(\theta)^{-1})$$

$$[\hat{\theta}_n \sim P_{\theta}]$$

information matrix

c) asymptotically optimal

(Cramér-Rao lower bound)

i.e. it has minimal asymptotic scaled variance among all "reasonable" estimators

d) invariance: MLE is preserved under reparameterization

suppose have a bijection  $f: \mathbb{A} \rightarrow \mathbb{B}$

$$\text{then } f(\theta) = f(\hat{\theta})$$

$$\text{example: } (\sigma^2) = (\hat{\sigma})^2$$

$$\sin \sigma^2 = \sin \hat{\sigma}^2$$

\* If not a bijection, can generalize the MLE with "profile likelihood"

Suppose  $g: \mathbb{A} \rightarrow \Lambda$

$$\text{profile likelihood} \triangleq L(m) = \max_{\theta: m=g(\theta)} p(\text{data}; \theta)$$

$$\text{define } \hat{m}_{MLE} \triangleq \underset{m \in \Lambda}{\operatorname{argmax}} L(m)$$

$$\text{then we have } \boxed{\hat{m}_{MLE} = g(\hat{\theta}_{MLE})}$$

"plug in estimator"

$$N(\mu, \sigma^2)$$

$$\text{e.g. } g(\mu) = \mu^2$$

prediction want to learn prediction fn.  $h: X \rightarrow \mathcal{Y}$   $\mathcal{Y} = \{0, 1\} \rightarrow \text{binary classification}$

prediction want to learn prediction fct.  $h: X \rightarrow \mathcal{Y}$

$\mathcal{Y} = \{0, 1\} \rightarrow$  binary classification  
 $\mathcal{Y} = \{0, \dots, k-1\} \rightarrow$  multiclass classification



$$x \in \mathbb{R}^d$$

"prediction model" model over  $X$

$$p(x, y) = p(y|x)p(x)$$

$$= p(x|y)p(y)$$

"class conditional" prior over class

"generative perspective" (in context of classification)  $\rightarrow$  model  $p(x)$  as well

"conditional perspective"

$\rightarrow$  only model  $p(y|x)$

"more discriminative"

traditionally called "discriminative"

generative	conditional	"fully discriminative"
model $p(x, y)$	model $p(y x)$	model $h: X \rightarrow \mathcal{Y}$ (not nec. derived from $p(y x)$ )
MLE	max conditional likelihood	reg. ERM; etc. $\frac{1}{n} \sum_{i=1}^n l(y^{(i)}, h(x^{(i)}))$
more assumptions $\rightarrow$ less robust for prediction		less assumptions more robust

$$\hat{h}(x) \triangleq \underset{y \in \mathcal{Y}}{\operatorname{argmin}} \sum_y p_{\hat{h}}(y|x) l(y, \hat{y})$$

if  $l(y, \hat{y}) = \mathbb{1}\{y \neq \hat{y}\}$  then  $\hat{h}(x) = \underset{y \in \mathcal{Y}}{\operatorname{argmax}} p_{\hat{h}}(y|x)$   
(0-1 loss)
